Market Commentary

U.S. stocks were lower on the week as trade tensions between the U.S. and China continued to mount. Other news from last week included the Fed's decision to increase its federal funds rate by 0.25%, making the new range 2.00% to 2.25%. The Fed also increased its forecast for economic growth this year to 3.1%. If the economy continues to grow, wages keep rising, and inflation stays near the Fed's 2% target, we expect continued quarterly increases to the federal funds rate. In addition, the Fed is steadily reducing its bond purchases to shrink its balance sheet. These actions mean monetary policy will slowly reduce the amount of stimulus for the economy.

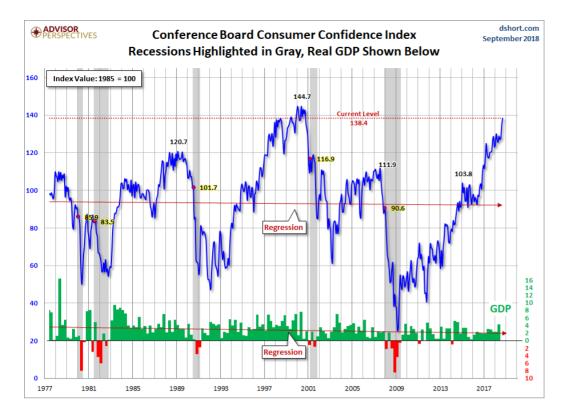


With three-quarters of 2018 in the books, we believe the stock market is in fairly good shape, despite the correction to start the year. Stocks pulled back slightly last week, with much of the market's attention centering on the Fed and the outlook for rate hikes. Key takeaways included the following:

- The Fed will continue to gradually increase rates The Fed hiked interest rates again last week, bringing the federal funds rate to its highest level in 10 years. Relative to hikes in prior years when equity markets reacted sharply and negatively to the Fed tightening, stocks have taken rate hikes much more in stride lately, given the Fed is hiking in response to economic strength. We maintain our view that tight monetary policy is a likely candidate slow-down the extended bull market. However, the equity market's reaction to current policy signals are not yet at a level that is undermining growth.
- Oil makes a run at the risk list Oil prices rose above \$73 per barrel last week, putting them near the highs for the year and just slightly below the highest level since late 2014. This has pushed prices at the pump notably higher. This does contribute to the larger inflation story and market risks as the Fed tends to focus on core consumer prices, which exclude volatile food and energy prices. Rising wages combined with potential upward pricing pressures stemming from tariff impacts and energy costs warrant a close eye on inflation expectations. Inflation has not reached tipping point levels, in fact, it just recently returned to the Fed's target level, but a sustained lift in the consumer price index would begin to limit the Fed's flexibility in taking a gradual approach to rate hikes.
- A strong quarter has turned 2018 into a strong year U.S. stocks posted a 7.2% gain for the third-quarter, the strongest quarter since 2013. Very strong earnings growth and a range of encouraging economic readings (including sub-4% unemployment, multiyear highs in wage growth, and rising consumer confidence) provided the fuel that pushed domestic stocks to outpace global markets in recent months. Moreover, the S&P 500 is now up more than 14% since early February, when stocks fell sharply in reaction to worries that the expansion would come to an end at the hands of rising rates. History suggests that strong third quarters often have a solid encore and over the last 50 years, when the stock market rose by 4% or more in the third quarter, the market rose by an average of 3% in the fourth quarter.

his week the Federal Reserve raised the fed funds rate (the overnight rate that banks lend reserves to one another) indicating that the economy is solid and continuing to grow-accompanied by a very low unemployment rate of 3.9%. According to various analyses of the labor market, there are now more jobs available than people looking for jobs. Kohl's, a well-known retailer plans to hire 90,000 temporary workers for the holiday season. Sales of big rig trucks more than doubled in May, rising to 35,600, or up 110 percent over the same month a year earlier, and the consumer confidence index surged well above expectations. The index now stands at 138.4 (1985=100), up from 134.7 in August as you can see in the chart below.



As the week came to an end, the debacle over the veracity of Judge Kavanagh continued to dominate the media while stock markets seemed to be more focused on interest rates than the outcome of the inquiry into the next Supreme Court justice. Last Friday, both the S&P 500 and the Dow Jones Industrial Average hit all-time highs providing further evidence that investors expect continued improvement in the economy.

During the week, several of our equity exchange-traded funds also hit new all-time highs while fixed income funds languished. International funds remained weak although they have experienced a brief relief rally. On balance we expect the third quarter to be favorable for the Target Return portfolios. In the Growth Equity portfolio, we sold a loser and added three new stocks with the potential for outperformance. Once we get into the third quarter earnings' season, we should get a better indication of how the equity markets will fare for the fourth quarter.

Redhawk's Strategy Update

After posting positive results the prior week, the S&P 500 and the Dow got off to a shaky start and ended up slightly negative overall. In contrast, the NASDAQ climbed after declining the previous week. With its 0.4% gain in September, the S&P 500 has now risen for six months in a row. The Dow added nearly 2% in September to record its fourth straight positive month, but the NASDAQ fell slightly, snapping a five-month string of gains.

Healthcare was the top-performing equity sector of the third quarter, posting a 14.5% return, the sector's biggest quarterly gain in more than five years. On a year-to-date basis, healthcare trailed only the information technology and consumer discretionary sectors.

U.S. consumers shrugged off trade and tariff trepidations, as a monthly indicator of consumer confidence climbed to its highest level in 18 years. Across the Atlantic, Brexit concerns sent U.K. consumer confidence further into negative territory.
